Provost's Message



What an extraordinary year 2006 has been for ENMU-Roswell! Because of the remarkable efforts of our exceptional faculty, staff, and students and the strong support of our community, we were able to accomplish great things this past year!

During 2006, enrollment tapered off, with 4,036 credit bearing students in the spring and 3,873 in the fall, partly due to the economic growth of our community. ENMU-Roswell is proud to have played a role in the economic development that Chaves County is experiencing, even if it means a temporary decline in enrollment. We continue to keep our resident tuition and fees lower than those of any other university branch campus and many of the independent community colleges in New Mexico.

One of the most significant events of the year was the highly successful site visit by a team of consultant-evaluators from the Higher Learning Commission. Based on the institution's self-study report and their observations and inquiries during their visit, the team recommended continuing accreditation, with the next site visit scheduled in 2016-2017. While their recommendation will not be official until the full commission votes on it later this year, it was gratifying to know that they, too, saw and appreciated

the tremendous energy on our campus. The team was especially impressed by the enthusiastic community showing of support for ENMU-Roswell, the quality of the faculty and staff, and the many partnerships we have formed. In addition to continuing accreditation, the team recommended accreditation status for all future online degrees without prior Commission approval.

Thanks to your support of local and statewide bond issues, ENMU-Roswell is buzzing with new construction. Our Health Science Center (HSC) is finished, and classes are meeting in the new building. Construction of Phase II of the Health Science Center, which will house the dental program, the community pharmacy, and additional classrooms, will begin in the near future. Soon, also, we will begin an expansion of the Aviation Maintenance Technology Center to house the National Flight Test Center and a much-needed renovation and expansion of the Campus Union Building. A new 258-bed, privately funded student housing project is going up quickly, and we are right on track to complete the complex in time for students to move into this coming fall.

We look forward to welcoming and working with our new Community College Board, the first ever to be elected solely for ENMU-Roswell. Additionally, we will be developing several new two-year and four-year degree programs this coming year. One of the most exciting projects we undertook this year is the development of the ENMU-Roswell Aviation Center Complex. This multi-faceted complex will house the Walker Museum, to preserve the significant history of Walker Air Force Base; the National Flight Test Center, to attract aviation industry to Chaves County; an interactive Learning Center; an advanced composites training facility; and room for a transport category airplane to expand and enhance skills for our aviation students.

You'll learn more about these and the other outstanding successes we have to share with you in our annual progress report. On behalf of the superior faculty, staff, and administrators at ENMU-Roswell, I invite you to review our 2006 Progress Report. We think you'll be as excited about your community university and its future as we are!

Thank you for your support of ENMU-Roswell. Together, we are building a bright future for our students and our community!

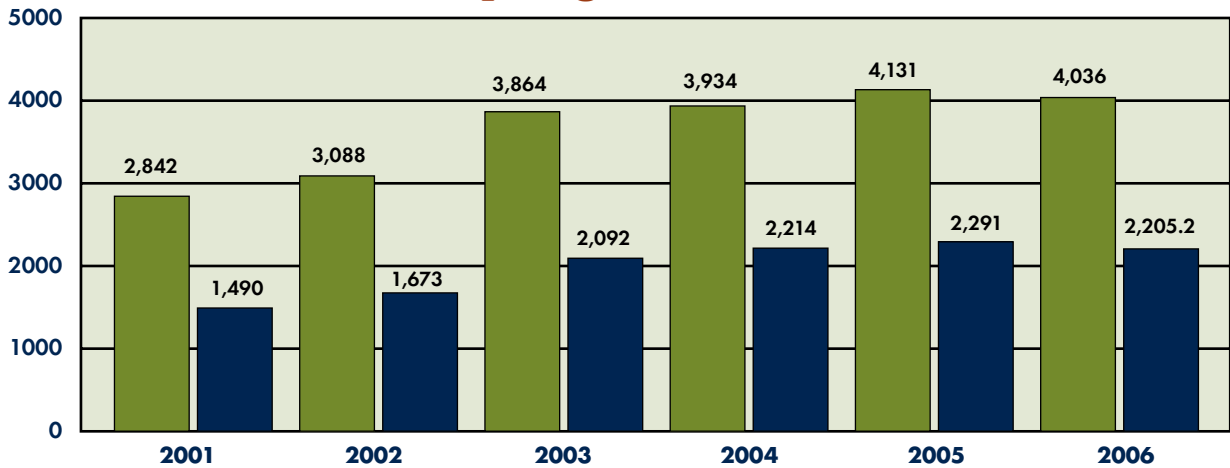

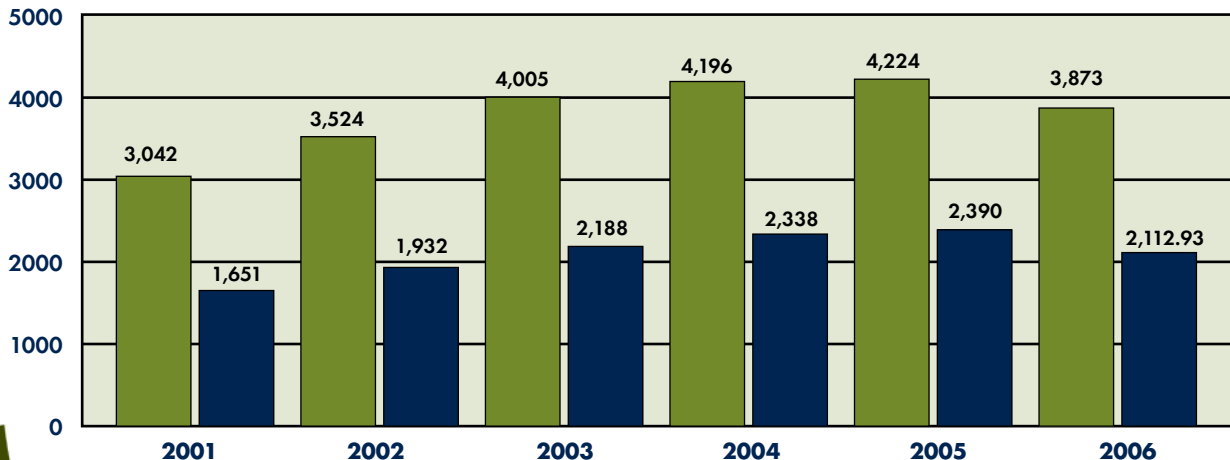
FALL 2006

Fall Enrollment



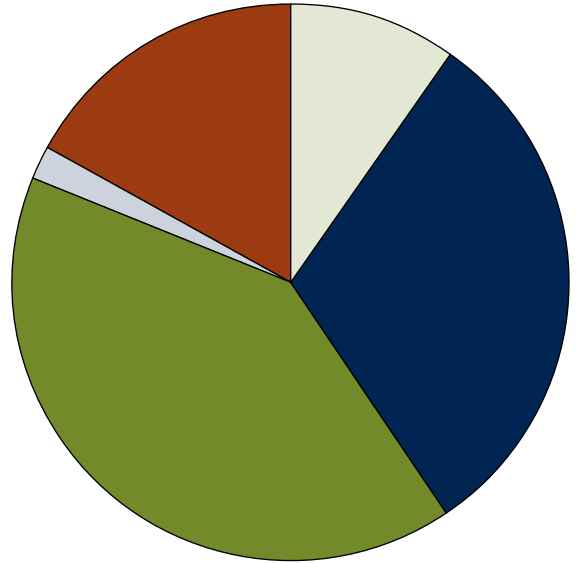

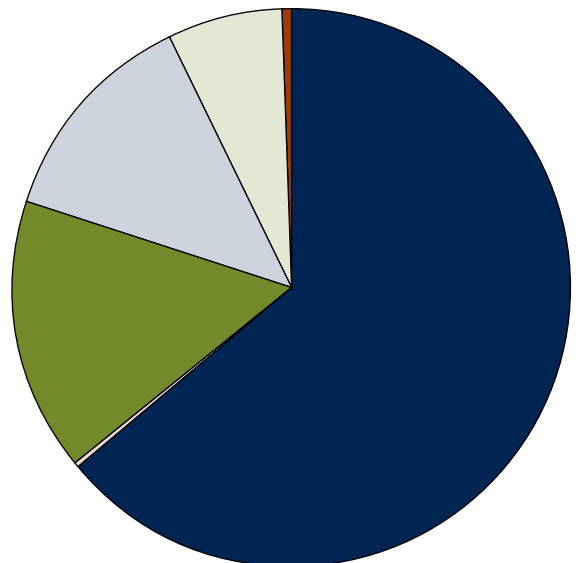

Opportunities

Accreditation Team Visit

A team representing the Commission on Institutions of Higher Education of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools recommended continuing accreditation for Eastern New Mexico University-Roswell, with the

next comprehensive evaluation visit scheduled for 2016-2017. The recommendation followed a two and a half day accreditation team visit in mid-November and is the first step in the evaluation process. A Higher Learning Commission readers' panel will review the recommendation and the Higher Learning Commission will take final action on continuing accreditation for ENMU-Roswell. The campus has been accredited by the Commission since 1971. Its accreditation is at the Associate's degree level.

Health Science Center

Construction of the new Health Science Center was completed in January 2007, in time for spring semester classes. The new facility features state-of-the-art classroom and lab space, in addition to a student health clinic. The \$7 million project was funded through a \$3 million statewide general obligation bond issue passed by voters in 2004 and a portion of an \$8.1 million local bond issue passed by Chaves County voters in 2003.

GO Bond Passage

Colleges and universities across the state celebrated the approval of General Obligation Bond Issue B, which passed by 55 percent in the November 7 General Election. In Chaves County, more than 14 thousand voters supported Bond Issue B, with a 64.8 percent 'yes' vote. Through Bond B, ENMU-Roswell will receive \$5.8 million for the construction of Phase II of the Health Science Center (HSC). The addition will extend to the East and South of the HSC and will be constructed to expand the Dental Assisting/Hygiene and Emergency Medical Services programs. Phase Two of the project will also house

the Dental Residency program from UNM, as well as the Community Pharmacy, and some additional EMS/all-purpose classrooms. Bond C to fund university, public, and school library acquisitions statewide, also passed by 57 percent in the November election. ENMU-Roswell's Learning Resource Center (LRC) will receive \$88,395, which will be used for library acquisitions, including updated print and online resources.

New Student Housing Complex

In November, ENMU-Roswell broke ground on the new student housing complex, Sierra Vista Village. Through a partnership with Collegiate Development, Inc., the privatized housing development project calls for the construction of three buildings with 258 beds and a community center, under a long term ground lease provided by the University. All costs would be covered by project revenue. The new housing units are expected to be ready for move-in for the fall 2007 semester.

Beyond Earth Enterprises Partnership

In July, the campus announced a partnership with Beyond Earth Enterprises, a leading provider of consumer-oriented spaceflight services. The company moved its headquarters from Colorado Springs, Colorado to Roswell, New Mexico and is the first space-related company to

headquarter in the state. Through the partnership agreement, ENMU-Roswell will provide access to campus services and equipment. The campus will also work with the company to develop new courses in areas such as radar technology, manufacturing, pre-engineering or specialized math and science courses. The company will provide internship and mentorship experiences for ENMU-Roswell students and serve as advisors in curriculum development and equipment acquisition in the areas of math, science, and technology.

Graduation Ceremonies

More than 200 graduates participated in the Forty-fifth Commencement Convocation on May 11 at the Roswell Wool Bowl. The featured speakers were former Roswell Mayor, Bill Owen and Richard Nava, who received Associate of Arts degrees in University Studies and Teacher Education. The night was capped off by a fireworks display.

It was standing room only for the Forty-sixth Commencement Convocation on December 14. In total, about 245 students completed degree or certificate requirements, making this the largest fall graduating class. William O'Brien, the National Resource Specialist for Airworthiness with the Federal Aviation Administration in Washington D.C. was the featured speaker. Hope Herrera, an ENMU-Roswell graduate who received a Bachelor of University Studies, was the student speaker.

About 40 students participated in ENMU-Roswell's Adult Basic Education Department's Seventeenth Annual GED High School Completion Graduation ceremony May 13. James Engelhard, former Director of the ENMU-Roswell Developmental Studies Lab, was the featured speaker.

The Special Services Occupational Training Program for students with disabilities held its Nineteenth Annual Graduation Ceremony July 27. The featured speaker was Michael Glen, the world's first disabled hot air balloon pilot. Fifty-five students graduated from the program in a number of areas, including Auto Mechanics, Child Care, Office Skills, Nursing Assistant, Veterinary Assistant, and Food Service.

Community College Board Election

Following the requirements of Branch Community College Act, the ENMU-Roswell Interim Branch Community College Board authorized an election to establish a permanent Branch Community College Board at the next regular school board election, which was February 6, 2007. Thirteen community members declared their candidacy for the five open positions.

EMS Accreditation

The Emergency Medical Services Program received full continuing accreditation by The Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs (CAAHEP). The program is one of only three accredited programs in New Mexico and one of 220 in the nation. The next comprehensive evaluation is scheduled for November of 2010.

Dental Hygiene Funding

In April, the campus received three \$5,000 checks from the Eastern New Mexico Dental Society, the New Mexico Dental Society, and the Albuquerque Dental Society regional and state dental associations to assist in the implementation of a new Dental Hygiene Program in

collaboration with the University of New Mexico. The state legislature also appropriated \$135,000 in funds for the establishment of a distance education Dental Hygiene Program on the Roswell campus. The legislature also provided \$100,000 for the expansion of the UNM Dental Residency program. The goal of the program is to enhance the quality of dentistry throughout the state and encourage dentists to stay in New Mexico. Second-year dental residents from UNM are expected to begin practicing in Roswell by July of 2007.

ENMU Nursing Funding

Eastern New Mexico University received grants for more than \$200,000 to expand and enhance nursing programs. The funding was approved through the legislature and awarded by the New Mexico Higher Education Department. ENMU-Roswell has received a \$112,000 grant and ENMU in Portales has received a \$110,000 grant. The overall goal is to graduate more students with nursing degrees in New Mexico. The ENMU-Roswell grant funds will be used to continue the enhancement of the basic nursing academic and clinical skills components of the ENMU-Roswell Nursing Program to insure that graduating students are academically prepared to transition to the ENMU Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) Completion Program.

The Small Business Development Center (SBDC) at

ENMU-Roswell continued to combine education and one-on-one assistance to maximize opportunities for its clients in 2006. Clients in Chaves and Lincoln counties can obtain free assistance in the preparation of business plans, loan applications, market research, cash market value analyses of existing businesses, research on any topics related to business, and much more.

Accomplishments

- The SBDC assisted 390 clients in Chaves and Lincoln counties, 303 of whom were new clients.
- \$8,973,239 million in capital formation was created for 25 different businesses.
- Eight new businesses were established.
- Two-hundred fifty new jobs were created.
- Forty-five existing jobs were retained.
- The Youth Entrepreneurship Program utilized a grant from the US Forest Service to initiate entrepreneurship training in three middle schools in the areas served by the Roswell SBDC.

ENMU-Roswell and the Department of Labor co-sponsored the Sixth Annual Southeastern New Mexico Job Fair on April 1 at the Roswell Civic Center. Hundreds of area residents attended the job fair, completing applications and meeting with potential employers.

Community Health Fair

A free Community Health Fair was held in July at the Roswell Boys and Girls Club. A number of health care screenings were provided to those who attended. The fair was sponsored by Eastern New Mexico Medical Center, ENMU-Roswell, the New Mexico Department of Health, the Community Care Network, and the Chaves County Health Planning Council.

Roswell Reads

The High Plains Writing Project worked with Roswell teachers and community leaders to promote literacy through a series of special events in March and April. The One Book, One Community event called "Roswell Reads *A Place to Stand*," is designed to encourage participation by the community at large in reading and discussing a book chosen for its appeal across age and social groups. The partners in the project are the Roswell Public Library, Roswell Literacy Council, ENMU-Roswell, Altrusa Club of Roswell, Sertoma, NMMI, and the ENMU Center for Teaching Excellence. The book's author, Jimmy Santiago Baca, conducted a writing workshop for students on campus and spoke about his experiences during a public presentation in the Performing Arts Center.

Aviation Maintenance Technician Day

The campus celebrated Aviation Maintenance Technician (AMT) Day in May at Pioneer Plaza. The New Mexico State Legislature has declared May 24 as Aviation Maintenance Technician (AMT) Day in New Mexico. AMT faculty, staff and graduates were joined by campus employees, city leaders and other officials for the ceremony, which was held to recognize the importance of aviation maintenance technicians and also to remember those aviation mechanics from the early days of flight.

Teaching and Learning

Online Courses

Students continue to enroll in an increasing number of online classes. Approximately 4,945 (duplicated) and/or 2,893 (unduplicated) students successfully completed online courses in 2006.

NM MESA Fall Design Competition

Close to 600 regional high school and middle school students attended the Fifth Annual NM MESA (Math, Engineering, Science Achievement) Southeast Region Fall Design Competition in November. Students from middle schools and high schools in the region competed in a number of creative math, engineering, science, and public speaking competitions. ENMU-Roswell faculty and staff members, as well as members of the community, served as judges.

USAF Paramedic Training

ENMU-Roswell entered into a unique partnership with the United States Air Force (USAF) to provide training to the Pararescue/Combat Rescue Officer (PJ/CRO) School at Kirtland Air Force Base (KAFB) in Albuquerque. The partnership calls for the Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) Basic and paramedic instruction to be provided by ENMU-Roswell for the next five years. KAFB is the home of the PJ/CRO School, and houses two of eight specialty schools that PJ/CRO candidates are required to complete. With this partnership, ENMU-Roswell has one of the largest training programs for paramedics in the nation.

ILEA

The International Law Enforcement Academy celebrated the dedication of its new building in February. To date, more than 1900 students from more than 70 countries have attended ILEA-Roswell since the first class began in September of 2001. Operated by New Mexico Tech under a cooperative agreement with the U.S. State Department, ILEA teaches mid-level and senior law enforcement officials how to operate in a democracy. As a partner, ENMU-Roswell provides food service and teaches English-as-a-Second Language and computer instruction for the students. In 2006, ILEA welcomed law enforcement officers from a number of countries, including Albania, Zambia, Russia, Romania, Peru, and Brazil.

Flight Research Training Center

The Flight Research Training Center (FRTC) is a Congressionally funded Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) research project designed to ultimately train 2,000 pilots in Roswell using unique in-flight simulation aircraft and techniques. Trainees receive both extensive ground school instruction and advanced "In-Flight Simulation" aircraft training on how

to respond to loss-of-control situations, which is currently the leading cause of airline accidents in the world.

The intent of the FRTC-Upset Recovery Training (URT) and research program is to reduce loss-of-control aircraft accidents in a meaningful and measurable way and create economic development opportunities in Roswell. To date, 313 FAA Advanced Maneuver-Upset Recovery Training Study Participants have received training and participated in the research. In addition, 10 Recurrent Training Participants have returned to Roswell as part of the research curriculum. The transition of the training center to a full customer funded facility is moving ahead as planned as numerous corporate pilots have also completed the course.

The FRTC has a full-time human factors specialist on staff and in 2006-2007 plans call for the continued operation of the center with the primary goal of performing and completing human factors based research studies designed to evaluate the efficacy of in-flight simulator based upset recovery training.

In early 2005, Alliance member, Calspan Corporation, purchased a new aircraft that is being modified to accept the new simulation systems. The deployment of this aircraft to Roswell on a full-time basis will result in a dramatic increase in the number of pilots trained per year and will ramp up sharply. The modifications to the aircraft and systems checks are expected to be complete in early 2007 with deployment to Roswell scheduled immediately thereafter.

ENMU-Roswell joined schools all across the country in celebrating Constitution Day on September 18. Activities on campus included a student art exhibit, a flag ceremony, and a campus-wide recitation of the Preamble to the Constitution.

Oceanography Course

ENMU-Roswell became one of more than 50 colleges and universities nationwide to join forces with the American Meteorological Society (AMS) to introduce a highly innovative online course that introduces students to the science of oceanography. James McClinton, Physical Science instructor, attended a one-week faculty workshop at the University of Washington's School of Oceanography in Seattle, Washington, as part of the course implementation effort. The course, Online Ocean Studies, was developed by the AMS with funding from the National Science Foundation (NSF). McClinton began offering the course in the spring 2007 semester.

Scholarships and Grants

Woman's Club Scholarships

Seventeen students at ENMU-Roswell were each awarded \$750 scholarships from the Roswell Woman's Club for the spring and fall semesters. The club awards scholarships to students who have a GPA of 3.0 or higher and have completed at least 12 credit hours. The object of the club is to promote higher educational, social, moral, and civic conditions in the community.

GEAR UP

Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs

ENMU-Roswell's GEAR UP grant program, funded by the U. S. Department of Education, completed its first year of a six-year commitment of services to parents, faculty, and to 1,632 sixth and seventh grade students, throughout Chaves County. The program is currently active and delivering additional services in its second year of funding to 7th and 8th grade students. The program is funded at \$1,300,000 per year.

Through the efforts of a trained professional staff of five housed at ENMU-Roswell, five site supervisors housed at selected target schools, and approximately 35 tutors, the program provided tutorial assistance to 794 students. Mentoring was provided to 1258 students, and a series of educational field trips, workshops, cultural and family events were held for 683 students and parents.

In addition, the GEAR UP grant funded curriculum, teachers and tutors for RISD's first sixth grade summer school program, in addition to Dexter, Hagerman, and Lake Arthur summer school programs. New partners were added to the ranks of working partnerships, allowing students to interact with Roswell's business, medical, and social services communities.

TRiO

Upward Bound (UB), Educational Talent Search (ETS), Educational Opportunity Center (EOC), and Student Support Services (SSS)

The TRIO Educational Opportunity Centers (EOC) Program at ENMU-Roswell was funded for an additional five years. The grant for \$330,840 is one of three awarded to New Mexico schools from the U.S. Department of Education. The EOC is a federally funded program that provides low-income adults with information about educational and career opportunities and places them in postsecondary and career/technical programs.

The TRIO Educational Talent Search program was funded for an additional five years. The grant for \$295,721 is one of three awarded to schools in southeastern New Mexico from the U.S. Department of Education. The TRIO Talent Search program provides academic, career, and financial counseling to students who have a disadvantaged background, but have the potential to succeed in higher education.

Pepsi Scholarships

A group of 29 students at ENMU-Roswell were named 2005-2006 recipients of the Pepsi Scholarship. Students either received \$250 for one semester or \$500 for the 2005-2006 academic year. Scholarships are awarded on a first-come, first served basis, divided between the fall and spring semesters.

Artesia Scholarships

Prior to graduation in May, 40 Artesia seniors were awarded the Provost scholarship. The scholarship includes tuition and fees, and is offered to high school students who have completed their seventh semester of high school with a 2.5 GPA and who are New Mexico residents.

Lottery Report Card

A 10-year report compiled by the New Mexico Lottery shows ENMU-Roswell students are greatly benefiting from the program. Since 1996, the New Mexico Lottery has raised more than \$275 million for education in New Mexico and close to 38,000 New Mexico students have received the Lottery Success Scholarship. From fiscal year 1997 through fiscal year 2005, 460 ENMU-Roswell students received a total of more than \$598,000 in funding. ENMU-Roswell had the second highest number of scholarship recipients among two-year branch institutions in the state, behind NMSU Dona Ana. The report also shows that Chaves County is also benefiting from the Lottery Scholarship. From fall 1997 through spring 2005, 1,327 students used the Lottery Scholarship to attend college, receiving more than \$3,552,000 in total awards. During that time period, the county had 355 graduates.

ENMMC Auxiliary Scholarships

Since the establishment of the Eastern New Mexico Medical Center Auxiliary in 1958, scholarships have been awarded to ENMU-Roswell students in the nursing field. In 2006, \$33,250 was awarded to students in the health care profession.

Nancy Breeden Scholarship

ENMU-Roswell student, Carolyn Sue Tyler, was the first recipient of the Nancy Breeden Scholarship. Opal and Everett Lankford, presented the \$500 scholarship in their daughter's name to Tyler in August. The Lankfords said when their daughter, Nancy, passed away, they wanted to do something in her memory and worked with the university to establish the scholarship.

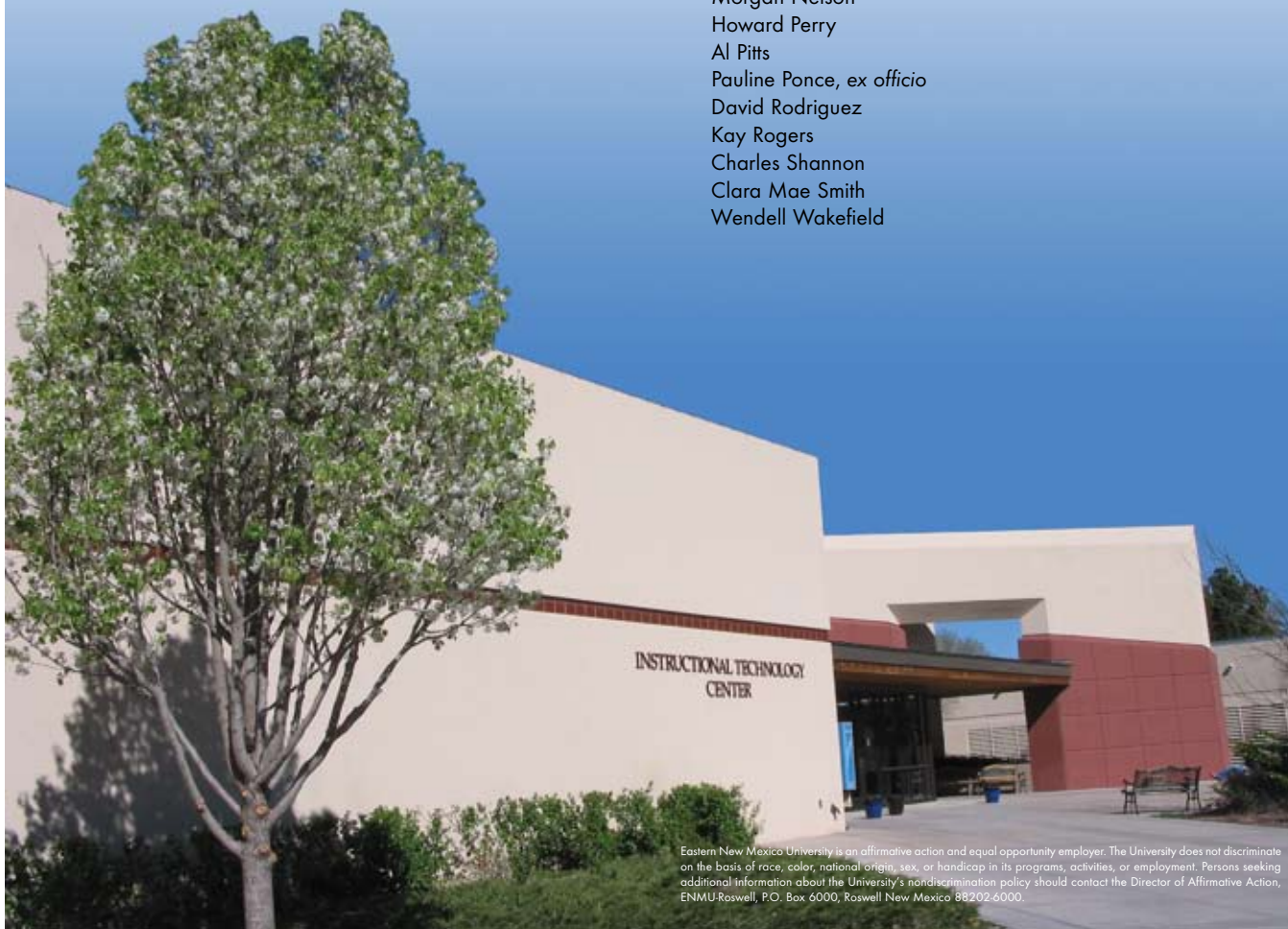

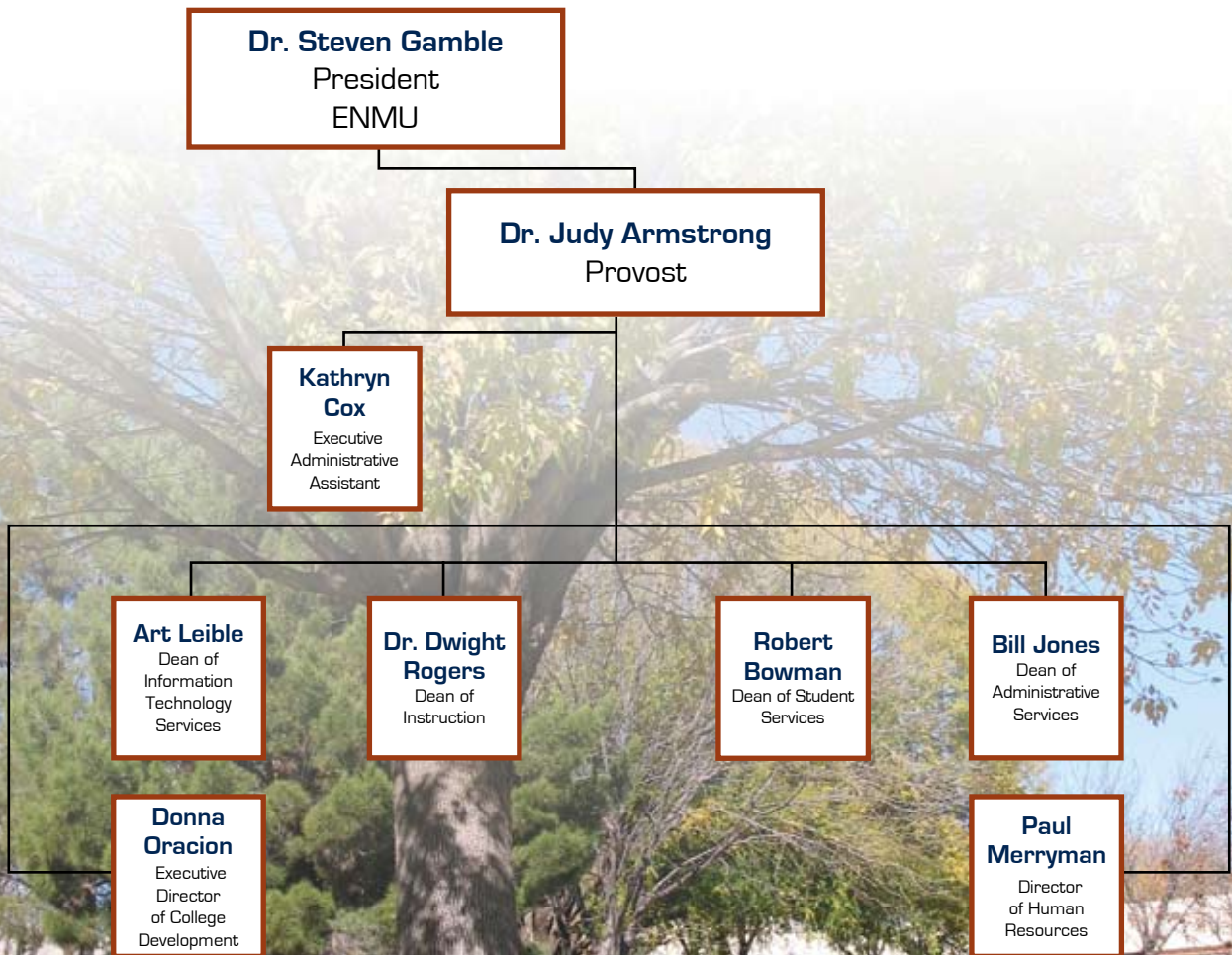
