Shawn Powell, Ph.D, vice president of academic affairs at Casper College in Casper, WY, has been named the new president of Eastern New Mexico University-Roswell. "I am delighted that Dr. Shawn Powell has accepted our offer to become the next President at ENMU-Roswell." said ENMU Chancellor Jeff Elwell. "He was the top choice of several of the search committee and Community College Board members and had strong support from the faculty and staff. I look forward to working with Shawn

"I am eager to be at ENMU-Roswell and appreciate this opportunity to work with the college's students, faculty, staff, and administrators," said Powell. "Lisa and I are looking forward to joining the Roswell community." Powell's first day on campus will be August 23.

Powell holds a doctorate in psychology and a master's degree in administrative leadership. He retired from the United States Air Force and Air National Guard after 30 years of service. His military service included a tour at the United States Air Force Academy as an associate professor of behavioral sciences and leadership and director of the cadet counseling center. He is a co-chair for Complete College Wyoming. He is a licensed psychologist and is board certified in school psychology. Powell was the founding director of the Wyoming National Guard Youth ChalleNGe Program and worked as a school psychologist in Wyoming public schools for 12 years. He is the president of the American Board of School Psychology and past president of the Wyoming Psychological Association. Powell and his wife, Lisa, enjoy outdoor activities and their dogs and cats.




Department Update

SECURITY UPDATE

The beginning of a semester can be fun, exciting, and even a bit confusing. Unfortunately even smaller college campuses can pose threats through new experiences and the attitude of "It won't happen to me". Many new students are so excited about their new environment and a new-found independence that they may not see the warning signs of trouble on the horizon. A few simple tips may make all the difference when it comes to how your college experience begins or continues. Some general safety guidelines are as follows:

Know how to contact campus Security and first responders (police, medic and fire). Campus Security can be reached by dialing 180 or 181 from a campus phone or 575-624-7180 & 575-624-7181 from a regular phone. You can also utilize the emergency phones on campus, they will dial security directly. To call 911 from a campus phone you must first dial 9 then 911, but don't forget to call campus security as well. We can respond faster and help stabilize the situation. We are also available 7 days a week, 24/7. Do not hesitate to contact us!
Familiarize yourself with the layout of the campus, stick to well-lit paths at night and travel in groups. Another option if you just aren't feeling all that safe, call campus security for an escort Know how to contact campus Security and

all that safe, call campus security for an escort to your class, dorm, or car. You might just see us out and about.
Be aware of your surroundings at all times! If you are walking through a parking lot, watch for moving vehicles or individuals looking for an opportunity to take advantage of others. Keen

for moving vehicles or individuals looking for an opportunity to take advantage of others. Keep your keys in hand and ready to use as soon as you arrive at your car or room.
Only cross the street only at intersections; don't jaywalk. Use marked crosswalks where available. Never cross in the middle of the street or between parked cars. Just because you have the right-of-way doesn't mean you'll get it. Don't assume a vehicle will stop, even at a stop sign.
Turn down your music! With so many portable music players, often you will see people wearing earbuds/ear phones or simply playing their music out loud. Eliminate distractions by lowering the volume level. This will allow you a better chance of avoiding a potentially dangerous situation.
Keep a record of serial numbers of electronic devices and pictures with accurate descriptions devices and pictures with accurate descriptions of valuable items. The Security department can even etch identifying features and maintain photo(s) of your valuable items. • And **ALWAYS LOCK YOUR DOORS!**

BOND D

BOND ISSUE TO BENEFIT AUTO AND WELDING PROGRAMS

This November, voters in Chaves County will be asked to invest in the state's public colleges, universities and specialty schools. General Obligation Bond D (referred to as GO Bond D) is asking voters to approve more than \$128 million for needed renovations, upgrades and improvements. If approved by voters statewide, GO Bond D will not increase property taxes.

In Chaves County, approval of Bond D will mean an allocation of \$3 million for ENMU-Roswell, which will fund needed renovations to the Automotive Technology/Welding facility on campus. Also, passage of Bond D is estimated to create approximately 112 jobs in construction, architecture and related fields, adding to our community's economic development and gross receipts tax revenue.

For many of New Mexico's colleges and universities, including ENMU-Roswell, GO Bond D is the only source of funding that allows us to re-invest and modernize facilities we already have, improve safety and technology, and boost degree and certificate programs that give our students the



knowledge and skills they need to pursue high-paying, in-demand careers.

These voter-approved funds are crucial to ensuring our schools remain competitive and are able to attract the best and brightest students and faculty, as well as provide a quality education and a safe learning environment. GO Bond D will not only invest more than \$128 million into our state's colleges, universities and specialty schools, but will do this without increasing the burden on New Mexico's taxpayers.

Absentee voting will be open from October 9-19. Early voting will be open from October 20 -November 3. Election Day is **Tuesday, November 6**, with polls open for in-person voting from 7 a.m.-7 p.m.
