## Campus Pays Tribute to Waldrip, Fleming, and Nelson



astern New Mexico University-Roswell pays tribute to three men who devoted their time and talents to the campus over many years. Jim Waldrip, Elvis Fleming, and Morgan Nelson have passed away, but their legacies remain and ENMU-Roswell staff, faculty and students will be forever grateful.

Jim Waldrip died just eight days before his 90th birthday on November 20, 2018. He served on the Foundation Board of Directors from 2012 to 2018. In addition to his service on the board, Waldrip taught Astronomy in the Physics department on campus for 15 years from 1999 to 2014. His classes were always popular with students, who came to share his passion for the universe. Waldrip and his wife, JoAnne, moved to Roswell in 1955 so that he could play for the Roswell Rockets professional baseball team. They both also began teaching for the Roswell Independent School District.

At 74, Waldrip joined the RISD School Board. He later served as President of the school board. Waldrip served Roswell in many capacities over 63 years. He was a coach, a high school and college instructor, a high school principal, and planetarium director. He received the 2018 President's Distinguished Award from the Foundation in recognition

of his advocacy for students.

Elvis Fleming passed away February 12, 2019 at 82 years of age. Fleming began teaching history and social sciences at ENMU-Roswell in 1969. He also served as chair of the Liberal Arts Division from 1992 through 1997, when he retired after 28 years on the faculty. He received the title of "Professor of History, Emeritus." After retirement, he devoted his time to researching and writing history, public speaking, and singing cowboy folk songs.

Fleming wrote a book on the history of ENMU-Roswell in 1991 and a second edition in 2003. He served on the board of directors and as volunteer archivist for the Historical Center for Southeast New Mexico. He received many literary awards for his work. Fleming also received the Lifetime Achievement Award from the Leadership Roswell Alumni Association and the Heritage Award from the Historical Society and Foundation for Southeast New Mexico.

Morgan Nelson passed away at 99 on March 1, 2019. He was a founding member of the ENMU-Roswell Foundation and served on the board from 1969 through 2017. He received the President's Distinguished Award from the Foundation in 2003. A long-time East

Grand Plains cotton and corn farmer, Nelson earned a degree in mechanical engineering and served in the Air Force. He was also a prolific writer and historian and was active in the revival of the Historical Society of Southeastern New Mexico.

Nelson is credited with establishing Roswell Community College, now ENMU-Roswell, through his work in the New Mexico House of Representatives. He served in the legislature for 12 years. He was instrumental in the passage of the 1957 Branch Community College Act. He also lobbied for the passage of the Junior College Act in 1963. When government officials announced that Walker Air Force Base would be closing on June 30, 1967, Nelson was part of the Executive Committee which oversaw the planning and development of the proposal to move Roswell Community College to the base facilities. In 2014, Morgan Nelson created a scholarship to honor his late wife of 58 years, Joyce. The Morgan and Joyce Nelson Endowed Scholarship assists financially struggling students enrolled at ENMU-Roswell.

Thank you, Jim Waldrip, Elvis Fleming and Morgan Nelson, for advancing and supporting the success of ENMU-Roswell.

## Students Selected to All-State Academic Team

Two ENMU-Roswell students have been named to the 2019 New Mexico All-State Academic Team in recognition of their top academic achievements. Natalia Vital and Shyla Ervin are among a group of outstanding New Mexico community college students who were honored February 13 at a formal awards ceremony during the All-State Academic Team Recognition Day at the State Capitol in Santa Fe. The program for the day included a recognition of team members in the House and Senate.

Vital, 20, is a Presidential Scholar and has served as the President of the PTK chapter on campus, Alpha Mu Pi, for the past two years. She is enrolled in the Occupational Therapy Assistant (OTA) Program and will graduate with an Associate of Science degree in May. She is also Vice President of the OTA club for the graduating class. Vital is active at St. John's Catholic Church, serving as a lector and organizing youth group retreats. She also volunteers for Roswell High School student council and National Guard public service events. She has been on the Dean's List since enrolling at ENMU-Roswell in the fall of 2016. "My vision is to change public policy through research to help people with disabilities live a more independent life with small changes that can be implemented to make our state and/or nation a more sensory friendly environment," she said. "My current goals are to first graduate with my associate's in OT. Then to enroll for my bachelor's at ENMU Portales in American Sign Language. Next, I will gain experience in the field of OT to enroll at St. Augustine University in Austin for my doctorate."

Ervin, 20, is also enrolled in the Occupational Therapy Assistant program and will graduate in May with an Associate of Science degree. She is a Presidential Scholar and serves as Vice President of ENMU-Roswell's PTK chapter and as President of the OTA club. "I have a passion for working in a pediatric setting but I am also passionate about teaching dance to children and teens of the ages 3 to 18. I have taught, choreographed, and assisted with productions. I have also been a student hire at the Health Science Center for the EMS department and have had a wonderful experience gaining knowledge and skills in the professional office setting." Ervin plans to take and pass the National Board Certification of Occupational Therapy exam to acquire her license. "I will then hopefully begin my career as a Certified Occupational Therapy Assistant while working towards a Bachelor of Arts and Science and Spanish. Once I finish my bachelor's, my ultimate goal is to be accepted and

complete a master's program or PhD to become a Registered Occupational Therapist. I also have the dream of applying and incorporating my dance background into occupational therapy," she said.

Phi Theta Kappa annually conducts a national community college student achievement competition, the All-USA Academic Team for Community Colleges. New Mexico's community colleges have actively participated in this program for many years and annually recognize the students who have been nominated by their institutions as members of the New Mexico All-State Academic Team.

To qualify for New Mexico's All-State Team, students have to maintain a minimum cumulative grade point average of 3.5, with demonstrated leadership skills and active involvement in community service. These students are recognized for outstanding achievement with certificates and medallions.
