## Census Participation

The U.S. Constitution mandates that a census of the population be conducted every 10 years and the Census Bureau's goal is to count everyone who lives in the United States. Census statistics are used to determine the number of seats each state receives in the U.S. House of Representatives, and will inform the allocation of billions of dollars in federal funds by state, local, and federal lawmakers annually for the next 10 years. Actual Census Day is April 1.





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
# Department Update

## **SECURITY UPDATE**

## **DISTRACTED DRIVING AWARENESS**

Distracted Driving is a huge problem in the United States today. To help ease the distractions from cell phone use, many states have gone to a hands-free solution. However, this does not really fix the problem. Even with new technology like speak to text or "infotainment" dashboards in vehicles can still effectively distract drivers. The National Safety Council estimates about one in four motor vehicle crashes involve cell phone use at the time of the crash. Those are only the accidents reported to have involved cell phones, many more occur but are not admitted to. Driver distractions have joined alcohol and speeding as leading factors in fatal and serious injury crashes. With the weather warming up there will be many more pedestrians out and about. These pedestrians might just be distracted by their electronic devices as well, so pay close attention to your surrounding environment.

Perhaps you have mastered the art of chewing gum and walking, but that doesn't mean you can talk on a cell phone and still devote your entire attention to driving. Most even have trouble walking and texting, remember the video of the girl who fell into a fountain because of texting and walking? Imagine how much more damage a car can do even at a low rate of speed.

## MULTI-TASKING: THE BIG FAT MYTH

The brain quickly toggles between tasks — but can't do two things at the same time.

The activity in the area of the brain that processes moving images decreases by up to 1/3 when listening to talking on a phone.

## ROLLAH ASTON SEEKS SUPPORT FOR THE BIG READ PROGRAM



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# Try It Track It Project

## STUDENT SUCCESS CENTER

## **DEFINE THE PROBLEM:**

The Success Center wanted to track usage of the academic lab section of the Success Center.

## HOW WAS IT ADDRESSED?

The Success Center staff desired to establish a welcoming, relaxed and studious environment for the academic community. Upon entrance to the Success Center, students were required to check in at the front desk with their Student ID number and were categorized as Academic Lab Use in the Who's Next system. After intake, patrons could use the computer lab, study rooms, collaborative stations, mobile whiteboards and/or study tables located within the Success Center portion of the Learning Resource Center. Students checked out through the front desk when leaving the Success Center.

## WAS IT SUCCESSFUL?

Success Center believed the Academic Lab environment assisted with student development during the Fall 2019 semester.

- 3019 total visits
- 495 ENMU-Roswell students enrolled in a Fall 2019 course utilized the Academic Lab
- The per week average for unique students was 113.8

• 2.52 was the mean GPA for students who utilized the Academic Lab.

 42.9% of academic lab usage was from 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM

• Fall 2018 to Fall 2019 increase in student total visit was 37.4%

 Fall 2018 to Fall 2019 increase in unique ENMU-Roswell students was 25.6%

## **DATA COLLECTED:**

On Monday of each week, Success Center staff collected and reconciled lab visits from the previous week. From this data, the Director sent a weekly lab usage report to the AVP of Arts and Science Education. The Grant Director for Title III Part F also received these lab usage reports that were used for monthly federal reports and will be used for each program's Annual Performance Report. These weekly reports established trend lines for computer lab usage and provided numeric data that validated that a designated academic lab is a major component of overall Success Center usage.

#### WHAT DID WE LEARN?

Monday reports were not submitted on time and some weeks were missed. Staff will be cross-trained on reconciliation and publication of academic lab usage. Tutoring reports will have

a division of labor approach this Spring.

• Staff believe increase in visits and student usage within the Success Center is a direct result of financial investments and remodeling which gave the facility a modern feel.

 Students utilized the tech enabled study rooms, especially Microsoft Wireless Direct.

 New printer purchased at the beginning of the Fall 2019 semester has greatly reduced student frustration with Success Center printing.

 A staffed computer lab, where students can ask for assistance, is a key component of the Success Center's success.

 Wireless connectivity issues were also greatly reduced in the Fall 2019 semester, which decreased student frustration.

• Peer networks were developed in the study rooms.

 Several faculty brought their classes to the Success Center and used the facility in a huddle space format.

• Staff plans to buy a modern look intake desk with Senderos funding.

• Staff redesigned LRC 134 into a conference room.

 Several times the computer lab was maxed out, staff increased computer lab from 12 to 16 stations.

 Students are requesting more study rooms.

 Staff believe a Presentation Lab is still needed.

 New group study tables, with tech integrated features, are needed in Study Rooms A, B, C, and D.
