




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Department Update

The Bitteroots by mystery and suspense author C.J. Box is one recommended by the LRC staff. Its heroine, former sheriff's investigator Cassie Dewell, finds herself up to her neck in a complex case involving a man from a well-known, influential Montana ranching family. He is accused of sexually assaulting his high school-aged niece and the case against him at first appears to be open and shut. But the deeper Cassie digs in her search for corroborating evidence, the more tangled and confusing things become. As with fellow suspense author Craig Johnson's Longmire books, the surrounding rugged western landscape acts as an important underlying character running through the book's entertaining, constantly evolving plot.
