Two instructors at Eastern New Mexico University-Roswell have been selected to receive 2019 Teaching Excellence Awards from the National Institute for Staff and Organizational Development (NISOD). This year, Linda Urie, Nursing instructor and Cory Cogdill, Mathematics instructor, have been selected. NISOD is a membership organization committed to promoting and celebrating excellence in teaching, learning and leadership at community and technical colleges. Urie, Cogdill and other Excellence Award recipients will be celebrated during NISOD's annual **International Conference on Teaching and Leadership Excellence**, May 25-28, in Austin, Texas.

Urie co-teaches the lecture and clinical components for level 1 nursing students. According to Candi Miller-Morris, Nursing Clinical instructor, Urie is very dedicated to student learning. "She developed a new clinical rotation that involves clinical simulation and helps the new nursing students learn to think critically and use clinical reasoning," said Miller-Morris. "Linda is very thorough and sets high standards for herself. She is always prepared and always available for students. In addition to his service as a Math instructor, Cogdill is also the Math director on campus. Robert Moore, Psychology instructor, nominated Cogdill for the award. 

WHAT'S NEW AT THE LRC

SECURITY UPDATE

For Your Safety & Ours

Spring time is here and summer is just around the corner! With the weather warming up and time change in effect it's unknown to the vast majority that the number of accidents increase during the warmer months. These are some tips to help you stay alert and safe while enjoying the weather.

-  Be observant of your surroundings! This includes all people and the environments you are in. Notify security if you feel someone doesn't belong on campus or is acting suspiciously.
-  Don't assume a vehicle will stop, even at a stop sign.
-  Use marked crosswalks where available and never cross in the middle of the street. If there is no crosswalk, only cross the street at a corner.
-  Stay close to children when crossing a street or walking along a sidewalk. Make sure younger children hold your hand or are carried, on the side of furthest from traffic.
-  Never push anyone off of the sidewalk or try to "beat" an oncoming vehicle across. If you have to walk on a road that does not have sidewalks, walk facing traffic.
-  Park in a well-lit area, next to a light pole if you can and know the parking lot that you're parked in.
-  While on campus, if you feel that you need an escort to your vehicle please contact the Security Office and we will be happy help.

Try It Track It Project

FORMATIVE ASSESSMENT THROUGH SOCIOLOGICAL COUPONS: A HIGH AND LOW CONTEXT CULTURE ASSIGNMENT ~By Edna Yokum

DEFINE THE PROBLEM:

Higher Education is changing, and assessments need to change with it. The recent inclusion of essential skills in general education courses in New Mexico is one example of this shift.

The problem was this: to find a way to holistically assess knowledge and skills which could no longer be captured within the scope of the traditional multiple choice midterm exam. If content and skill go together, is there a culturally responsive formative assessment that would measure content mastery and skill proficiency simultaneously?

HOW WAS IT ADDRESSED?

Students engaged in an in-class activity that took two class periods to complete. During Day One, they selected two vocabulary terms “out of a hat.” They were responsible for creating two coupons (one for each term) in which they incorporated the term and definition. As part of the drive to be culturally responsive in instruction, the students could work as individuals or in pairs, which allowed them to navigate their cultural contexts while showing content and skill mastery. The students were given a few examples using terms that were not available in the hat. They then had to write both coupons on chart paper to be displayed around the room.

During Day Two, the students were given post-it notes. They received direct guidance on writing constructive feedback for the coupons (such as “Your term is clear and understandable” instead of “Great job, I love it!”). They were tasked with walking around the room to read all the coupons; they would then leave comments for their classmates on whether they “got” the term or were left “needing more” information.

WAS IT SUCCESSFUL?

Yes, the project was a successful formative assessment of skill proficiency and content mastery. Just as the project had two-steps, so did the assessment. In the first level of assessment, an understanding of students’ ability to communicate, think critically, and demonstrate social and personal responsibility was evident in the process in which the students engaged. In the second level of assessment, the student’s level of understanding of key concepts within sociology was also evident.

DATA COLLECTED:

As for skill assessment, the journey was just as important as the final product. Below is the data collected, broken down into the three skills:

1) Critical thinking: Some students were comfortable making the critical connections of taking a term “out of context” and creating a new context. Other students struggled, which could be a reflection of lack of content mastery OR ability to think critically. Arguably it was more about critical thinking from the conversations during the activity. They couldn’t think of the term outside of the context of the textbook.

2) Communication: Some students were more comfortable with using writing as an additional form of communication during this assignment than they were previously in the beginning of the semester. The coupons offered a different genre and medium for them to practice their communication skills that previous assignments (Jigsaw on whiteboards OR formal written Current Event Analysis’). Again, the level of proficiency was evident in the final products through grammar/spelling and flow of information.

3) Personal and Social Responsibility: This skill was more nuanced in the assignment, but their level of civic discourse was evident in the way they presented the terms in the coupons. For example, the actual content of the sales pitch showcased their level of cultural relativism within the context of our society. Most were able to blend humor with cultural relativism.
