

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Program Overview

Nurses are in high demand nationwide and a career in nursing can be very rewarding. Nurses are consistently rated first in most ethical professions. ENMU-Roswell's Associate of Science in Nursing Program is accredited by the Accrediting Commission for Education in Nursing and the New Mexico Board of Nursing. Following completion of the first year requirements (which may take one academic year or more to complete), students begin a two year (or a minimum of four semesters) program of study leading to an Associate of Science degree in Nursing. Following graduation, candidates sit for the National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses (NCLEX-RN). Mandatory background checks and drug screens are required for all students enrolled in the nursing core courses.

Completion Options

The first year of the program consists of selected academic courses (including but not limited to Biology and Anatomy and Physiology) in preparation for progression into the nursing core courses. Enrollment in the nursing core courses is limited.

The Associate of Science degree in Nursing transfers into a Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) Degree program at ENMU.

Career Outlook


Employment of registered nurses is projected to grow 12.1 percent from 2018 to 2028, much faster than the average for all occupations. Growth will occur for a number of reasons, including an increased emphasis on preventive care; growing rates of chronic conditions, such as diabetes and obesity; and demand for healthcare services from the baby-boom population, as they live longer and more active lives. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the mean starting salary in New Mexico is 73,300 per year or 35.18 per hour. Nationally, the mean annual salary is \$77,460 and may go as high as \$111,220 in certain specialty nursing areas.

Program Learning Outcomes

The curriculum outcomes for the associate degree in nursing program at Eastern New Mexico University-Roswell are derived from and reflect the philosophy and conceptual framework. - Utilize technologies for the management of information and in the delivery of client care.



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
