ENMU-ROSWELL STUDENTS SELECTED TO ALL-STATE ACADEMIC TEAM

Two ENMU-Roswell students have been named to the 2019 New Mexico All-State Academic Team in recognition of their top academic achievements. Natalia Vital and Shyla Ervin are among a group of outstanding New Mexico community college students who will be honored February 13 at a formal awards ceremony during the All-State Academic Team Recognition Day at the State Capitol in Santa Fe. The program for the day includes a recognition of team members in the House and Senate.

Vital, 20, is a Presidential Scholar and has served as the President of the PTK chapter on campus, Alpha Mu Pi, for the past two years. She is enrolled in the Occupational Therapy Assistant (OTA) Program and will graduate with an Associate of Science degree in May. She is also Vice President of the OTA club for the graduating class. Vital is active at St. John's Catholic Church, serving as a lector and organizing youth group retreats. She also volunteers for Roswell High

School student council and National Guard public service events. She has been on the Dean's List since enrolling at ENMU-Roswell in the fall of 2016. "My vision is to change public policy through research to help people with disabilities live a more independent life with small changes that can be implemented to make our state and/or nation a more sensory friendly environment," she said. "My current goals are to first graduate with my associate's in OT. Then to enroll for my bachelor's at ENMU Portales in American Sign Language. Next, I will gain experience in the field of OT to enroll at St. Augustine University in Austin for my doctorate."

Ervin, 20, is also enrolled in the Occupational Therapy Assistant program and will graduate in May with an Associate of Science degree. She is a Presidential Scholar and serves as Vice President of ENMU-Roswell's PTK chapter and as President of the OTA club. "I have a passion for working in a Pediatric setting but I am also passionate about teaching dance to children and teens of the ages 3 to 18. I have taught, choreographed, and assisted with productions. I have also been a student hire at the Health Science Center for the EMS department and have had a wonderful experience gaining knowledge and skills in the professional office setting." Ervin plans to take and pass the National Board Certification of Occupational Therapy exam to acquire her license.

Phi Theta Kappa annually conducts a national community college student achievement competition, the All-USA Academic Team for Community Colleges. New Mexico's community colleges have actively participated in this program for many years and annually recognize the students who have been nominated by their institutions as members of the New Mexico All-State Academic Team.

To qualify for New Mexico's All-State Team, students have to maintain a minimum cumulative grade point average of 3.5, with demonstrated leadership skills and active involvement in community service. These students are recognized for outstanding achievement with certificates and medallions.



SECURITY UPDATE

ATTENTION STUDENTS WITH ELECTRONICS

The amount of money invested in electronics for college students has grown tremendously and will continue to do so as more innovations in technology are made. Protecting these investments is a must! CKI is now official! CKI (Circle K Club) of ENMU-Roswell has been chartered as of December 6, 2018. They have already participated in fundraisers, community projects and assisted with the Kiwanis All Civic Club Luncheon in November. ENMU-R is excited to have CKI as a active club on campus. They are always looking for new members.

Circle K International is a service organization formed to help the community through various service projects. It is part of an umbrella of organizations led by Kiwanis International. Circle K International also aims to build fellowship and create leaders within the membership.

The organization raises funds for various causes. The major initiative is: "Focusing on the Future: Children" which aims to help children of ages six to thirteen. In 2007, Circle K partnered with the U.S. Fund to help raise \$500,000 for UNICEF in efforts to help children around the world who do not have access to clean drinking water. This is called "Saving Lives – The Six Cents Initiative." It got its name from the cost in U.S. funds, to purchase one pack of rehydration salts to purify a day's worth of drinking water. Their service partners include UNICEF, Students Team Up to Fight Hunger (STUFH), March of Dimes, Better World Books,

Junior Chamber International, and the St. Baldrick's Foundation.

In 2017, Circle K International partnered with UNICEF to adopt the five-year signature project WASH. Circle K International aims to provide education, awareness, and funding to supply clean drinking water and sanitation education to schools and children in Haiti to target Haiti's emergency needs to reach 200,000 people in cholera-affected areas with a complete WASH response package.


group for the past 25 years. He is an experienced pilot with Cessna's, Caravans, Pilatus-PC 12 and has worked as an emergency medical services pilot.

DIRECTOR OF CAMPUS SAFETY AND SECURITY

Please welcome Brad McFadin, Director of Campus Safety and Security. Brad recently worked for Aaron Holloman, City Attorney of Roswell. Previously he worked as the Deputy Chief of Police for the City of Roswell. He was solely responsible for the planning and preparation of an annual \$11.5 million budget. He supervised every division and employee within the department. He coordinated meetings with departmental supervisors to plan operations. He coordinated with outside law enforcement agencies to plan and execute operational plans. Brad was very involved with recruitment, selection, and hiring of employees. He responded to major crime scenes and natural disasters. He was responsible for updating policies and procedures and assumed all duties of the Chief of Police when the Chief was absent for any period of time. Brad retired with the city after 25 years of service.

Brad will direct the work of the Campus Safety and Security Department, including fire and life safety, parking enforcement, and environmental compliance and sustainability. As director, he will oversee emergency management, as well as conduct safety training throughout the campus.

Try It Track It Project

DEFINE THE PROBLEM:

Success Center staff wanted to survey current students enrolled in a MATH course about their usage or non-usage of MATH tutoring. Success Center staff believed feedback enlisted from both sets of students would provide valuable insights to improving facilities and tutoring services.

HOW WAS IT ADDRESSED?

Success Center staff developed a survey instrument that had two options, one for students who have used MATH tutoring during the semester and another for those who have not used MATH tutoring during the same time frame. Success Center personnel administered the survey for sampled courses at the beginning of class time. The survey was conducted during the week of October 15th-19th.

WAS IT SUCCESSFUL?

After analyzing the results, Success Center staff believed the survey was a good tool to gauge real time student interest during the semester, not after the semester is over.

We also believe that the in-class survey process was an effective outreach program for tutoring offered by the Success Center.

STUDENT SUCCESS CENTER

DATA COLLECTED:

The survey instruments collected quantitative and qualitative data. A total of 125 MATH students took the survey, with a total of 322 categorical responses. 80 students supplied written comments.

Top three reasons why students who ARE utilizing MATH tutoring:

- 1) I need help
- 2) Resources (i.e. calculators, white boards, computers)
- 3) Knowing Help Is Available While Doing Homework

Top three reasons why students who ARE NOT utilizing the MATH tutoring:

- 1) Don't Feel The Need For Tutoring
- 2) My Schedule
- 3) Hesitant To Ask For Help

WHAT DID WE LEARN?

From analysis of both quantitative and qualitative data sets, Success Center staff concluded:

- 1) More exclusive promotions designated towards MATH tutoring.
- 2) Continue building relationships with MATH faculty.

- 3) Conduct research on the "hesitant student" and develop program to get them to use Success Center.
- 4) Redesign some space in the Success Center specifically designed for writing tutoring.
- 5) Consider a "roll out" event in the Spring 2019 to demonstrate and model recent tech additions to the Success Center.
